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INPS 2021 Grant Opportunities Research and Survey Grants Open through January 31, 2021

Students, citizen scientists, conservation groups and institutions are alerted to consider applying for an INPS Research Grant for up to \$2500 to fund one-year projects. The grant is for research-focused studies on Illinois native plants such as life history, reproductive biology, demography, genetics, comparative site inventories, community ecology, as well as research on threats to native plants and communities, such as invasive species. Laboratory research as well as projects focused on research relating to education about or restoration of native plants and plant communities will be considered. Projects involving student research or volunteers will be given special consideration. All projects must demonstrate how they support the mission of the Illinois Native Plant Society.

INPS is also excited to continue its new second grant for 2021: the Survey Grant. This grant for up to \$5000 will fund searches for Illinois Endangered, Threatened or certain rare species for which current data is inadequate to assess their status and for which field surveys and recovery recommendations are needed. INPS worked with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to develop a priority list of species for the surveys. Experienced botanical field surveyors, either independent or associated with an institution, are invited to apply for this grant. Partnerships are encouraged.

Feature Plant of the Month | Inland (River) Oats,

Chasmanthium latifolium

Also known at Indian woodoats, this grass adds unique interest to the winter landscape with its cascading, drooping seed heads, creating a fluttering effect in the breeze. The spikelets (seeds) are sometimes tinted red along the edges and its broad leaves would also be a great addition to native plant floral bouquets and winter arrangements. The leaf blades are typically a lanceoloate and light green (cream color in the winter). It is tolerant of poor soils, but grows the best in moist to wet, well-drained soils. It is one of the grasses that can actually tolerate shade, but it is a eager self seeder, so you may have to take additional measures to ensure it doesn't encompass beyond the designated space.







November Program, Which Grass is Which? by Erin Garrett

INPS Southern Chapter continued our virtual chapter meetings in November with Board Member Erin Garrett giving a presentation on grass identification basics. The presentation covered the basic characteristics and terminology used in identifying grasses as well as specifics on many of the common grasses found in southern Illinois. While grass identification can seem to technical and overwhelming to some people, Erin presented tips and techniques for identification that can be used in the field and that did not rely on a lot of technical know-how or exact measurements.

How well do you know your trees?

Knowing your trees is an important skill to have when managing a forest. The most common way to identify trees is their leaves, but trees spend almost half of the year leafless.

In this free three-part webinar series, University of Illinois Extension Forester <u>Chris Evans</u> will teach the basic characteristics that are used to



identify trees in winter - location, bark, twigs, buds. He will also cover in detail how to ID common and uncommon Illinois trees, and spend time focusing on the hard-to-identify groups, such as hickories. Sign up to attend one or all three sessions.



February 1 | 2-3PM | Introduction and Basics

Characteristics used in identification, terminology, and techniques and tools for identifying unknown tree species.

February 3 |2-3PM | Winter Identification of Common Trees of Illinois

This session will cover the characteristics used to identify in winter the tree species commonly found in Illinois.

February 5 | 2-3PM | Winter Identification of Uncommon Trees and Difficult Groups

This session will focus on tree groups that are difficult to identify by species in winter, such as oaks and hickories. Also covered are uncommon tree species found in Illinois.

Non-Native Invasive Species Update (NNIS)

With many of the volunteer and in-person events cancelled more focus can be directed towards management on our own properties. Winter is a great time to walk your woods in search of woody invasive species such as bush-honeysuckle or autumn olive. These invasive bushes retain their leaves after the leaves of trees have fallen, making reconnaissance and identification easier from a distance. Just as your car needs maintenance your woods also need maintenance to keep unwanted species out.

For assistance acquiring tools and herbicide to manage invasive species that you encounter on your property, contact rtrcwma@gmail.com and a delivery or pickup can be organized. This assistance program is made possible through a federal LSR grant and is in collaboration with the Forest Restoration Support Team and the Southern Illinois Prescribed Burn Association.
