Events are free and open to the public





Trail leader Chris Benda will lead the group on the wonderfully scenic loop around the rock escarpments and share stories of its rich history. Directions from Harrisburg: follow Highway 34/145 south 6 miles, then continue on Highway 34 south for 9 miles. Turn east onto Karbers Ridge Road, and follow it 8.3 miles to the Rim Rock entrance road. There is a parking lot and restroom facilities are available at the trailhead.

From the US Forest Service Success Stories Reporting System: Shawnee National Forest and Partners Bring Dr. Douglas Tallamy to Southern Illinois The Southern Chapter of the Illinois Native Plant Society sponsored a presentation by Dr. Douglas Tallamy entitled

The Southern Chapter of the Illinois Native Plant Society sponsored a presentation by Dr. Douglas Tallamy entitled "Bringing Nature Home -How You Can Sustain Wildlife with Native Plants." The Shawnee National Forest helped in providing transportation for Dr. Tallamy. The presentation was a huge, standing-room-only success, with over 250 people in attendance. While in southern Illinois, he also gave the presentation to several groups near Saint Louis. Dr. Tallamy's presentation highlighted the benefits of landscaping with native plants and the threats of habitat loss and invasive species. It also showed private landowners how they could contribute in a meaningful way to provide habitat necessary to sustain native plants and animals. These types of presentations are a good example of managing across boundaries and helping to educate private landowners about the value of native species.
